


Pursuant to the Brown Act 54953.3. A member of the public shall not be required, as a condition to attendance at a meeting of a legislative body of a local agency, to register his or her name, to provide other information, to complete a questionnaire, or otherwise to fulfill any condition precedent to his or her attendance.

If an attendance list, register, questionnaire, or other similar document is posted at or near the entrance to the room where the meeting is to be held, or is circulated to the persons present during the meeting, it shall state clearly that the signing, registering, or completion of the document is voluntary, and that all persons may attend the meeting regardless of whether a person signs, registers, or completes the document.

1. Call to Order/Welcome/Introductions
Wehbe called the meeting to order at 10:35 a.m.
2. Public Comment for Items Not on the Agenda – none
3. Approval Meeting Minutes
Thursday, March 21, 2019 Safe Committee meeting
On a Motion by Bass, seconded by Costello, the Safe Committee voted to approve minutes from Thursday, March 21, 2019 meeting. Wehbe abstained due to absence.
4. LAPD SLO, Officer Paul Jordan
Jordan reported that crime in the Media District continues to be down. He also mentioned that since the opening of the Hollywood Bridge Housing on Schrader Blvd. and due to the buffer area around the new location, there has been a slight increase in homeless in the Media District. Jordan also mentioned that there has been an increase in the need for sanitation services around the new Bridge Housing facility. There was brief discussion regarding traffic and parking of cement trucks along Romaine St and Sycamore Ave. cuing up for the Cemex Plant. Hernandez reported that Walgreens now has an on-site security guard.
5. City of LA Neighborhood Prosecutor, Ethan Weaver
Weaver said that the Hollywood Bridge Housing has consolidated services for the homeless and there has been a noticeable reduction of encampments throughout Hollywood.
6. Presentation – Ready Your LA Neighborhood
Veronica Hendrix and Annabelle Eubank, Emergency Management
Hendrix introduced herself and said she is with the City of Los Angeles Emergency Management Department. She handout brochures and explained what Emergency Management does. She showed the Committee a video about preparing for an emergency.

7. Andrews Global report

Davis reported about calls they have received, and Adams reported they will be doing a count of homeless individuals in the BID.

8. Old Business – none

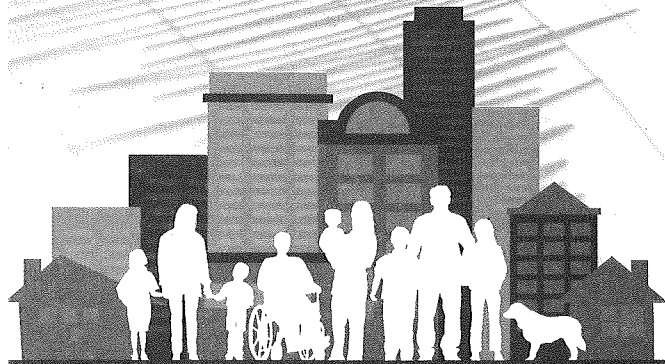
9. New Business

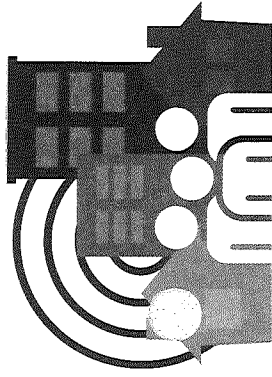

To organize your neighborhood for disaster— BEGIN HERE



WHY NEIGHBORHOODS?

Disasters overwhelm 9-1-1 emergency responders (medics, fire, & police). If you have a crisis—say a loved one is seriously injured—you're the best source of help will be your neighbors.

PLAN

THE GOLDEN HOUR:

The first 60 minutes following disasters are golden—for saving lives, reducing the severity of injuries, and decreasing property damage.



HOW BIG SHOULD MY NEIGHBORHOOD BE?

The size is determined by the Golden Hour.

Experience shows the ideal size for neighborhoods is:

Single-Family: 15–20 houses

Vertical Neighborhood: the entire building

Less-Populated Neighborhood: 5–7 houses

 - Maps of your neighborhood

INVITE YOUR NEIGHBORS

KEYS FOR SUCCESS:

- Hold a meeting at a home in your neighborhood.
- Invite your neighbors in person. Use the provided written invitation as a meeting reminder. A personal invite makes all the difference in encouraging your neighbors to come.
- Ask a neighbor or two to help you do the inviting.

MEET

HOLD A MYN

(Map Your Neighborhood) MEETING

A 90-minute meeting teaches you what to do in the critical first hour following disasters.

You will:

- Learn the Neighborhood Response Plan.
- Complete a Skills & Equipment Inventory.
- Complete a Neighborhood Contact List, including neighbors with disabilities, those who are elderly, and homes with pets.
- Plan to conduct a walk-through in your neighborhood.

All will leave the meeting with:

- A Neighborhood Response Plan
- A neighborhood map
- An OK/Help card

PREPARE

HOLD YOUR NEIGHBORHOOD EXERCISE

- Practice the Neighborhood Response Plan.
- Complete the Neighborhood Map by plotting the exact locations of all the natural gas meters.
- Discuss the neighborhood response to different disaster scenarios.

DESASTRES Y EMERGENCIAS

Documentos Importantes de la Familia

- Identificación: licencia de manejar, certificado de nacimiento, pasaportes y cuentas bancarias
- Seguros, documentos de préstamos, testamentos
- Una lista de los miembros de la familia con información de contacto (casa, celular, trabajo, dirección)
- Es recomendado copiar documentos y archivos importantes de su computadora usando un disco compacto o otros medios reutilizables.

Asuntos Médicos

- Proveedores médicos
- Medicinas y una lista de cuando se deben de tomar
- Necesita por lo menos siete días de medicinas recetada por un doctor y copias de las recetas
- Hacer planes ya sea que las medicinas requieran ser Refrigeradas o requieran usos especiales (e.g. neveritas o compresas de hielo)

Botiquín de Primeros Auxilios

- Vendajes, gasa, toall sanitarias, guantes de caucho
- Alcohol, peroxide de hidrógeno

Herramientas

- Radio (AM/FM) portátiles operados con baterías o manivelas
- Linterna, baterías adicionales
- Llaves para apagar el gas

Suministros

- Dinero en efectivo (por lo menos \$100-\$200 en billetes pequeños)
- Jabón, papel higiénico y bolsas plásticas
- Un cambio de ropa y zapatos para cada persona
- Cobijas o talego de dormir para cada persona de la familia
- Un llavero adicional y productos femeninos

Comida y Agua

- Agua - 1 galón/por persona/por día incluyendo criaturas o niños (es preferible abastecerse de agua por una semana, anotando la fecha de vencimiento)
- Comida que puede conservarse sin estar refrigerada, que no necesite ser cocinada y que requiere poca o nada de agua
- Comida adicional, si se requiere comida con la medicina
- Seleccione comida con cuidado considerando necesidades de dieta

Acceso Para Los Incapacitados

Si usted tiene una discapacidad o tiene movilidad limitada, asegúrese que su suministro incluya artículos específicos a sus necesidades

- Equipo adaptables que son usados
- Instrucciones como usar esos equipos adaptables

Para Bebés / Niños

- Formula y Biberones
- Pañales
- Medicinas
- Suministro para limpiar
- Un juguete o libro familiar
- Asiento de auto

Para Mascotas

- Placas de Identificación
- Comida y agua adicional
- Suministro para limpiar
- Medicinas
- Un bolsillo de transporte
- Una traílla

FAMILY DISASTER SUPPLY CHECKLIST

Important Family Documents

- Identification: Driver's licenses, birth certificates, passports, social security cards, bank account information, and recent photographs of family members
- Insurance, loan documents, wills, trusts, and certificates
- A list of family members with contact information (home, cell, work, address)
- Copy important documents to a flash drive and place in another secure remote location

Medical

- Medical provider information
- Medications and when you need to take them
- At least a seven-day supply of prescribed medicines and if possible, copies of prescriptions
- If medications require refrigeration or special handling, make special plans (e.g., cold packs, ice cooler, mini refrigerator)

First Aid Kit

- Bandages, gauze, wipes, rubber gloves
- Rubbing alcohol and hydrogen peroxide

Tools

- Battery, solar powered or hand-crank AM/FM radio
- Flashlight with extra batteries
- Wrench for turning off gas

Supplies

- Cash - at least \$100-200 in small bills per person
- Soap, toilet paper, toothbrush/paste and plastic bags
- Two complete sets of clothing and shoes per person
- Blankets or sleeping bags for each person
- Extra set of keys
- Feminine products

Water and Food

- Water - 1 gallon per person per day including infants and children (a week's supply labeled with expiration date)
- Non-perishable food that does not require refrigeration, preparation/cooking, and little or no water
- Extra food (remember special dietary needs)

Persons with Disabilities & Others with Access & Functional Needs

If you are a person with a disability, have an impairment or limited mobility, make sure your emergency kit includes items specific to your needs and have a list of the following:

- Adaptive or supportive equipment and extra batteries
- Instructions on how to operate any special equipment

For Baby / Children

- Formula and bottles
- Diapers
- Medications
- Sanitary supplies
- Familiar toy or book
- Car seat

For Pets

- Identification tags
- Extra food and water
- Clean-up supplies
- Medicine
- Transport case
- Leash
